<p><u>WRITING</u> Create a wanted poster for Hefty Hugh and Lanky Len! Draw a picture of them in the big box and ask an adult to write your ideas underneath. <i>Encourage your child to tell you what they did that was wrong. These suggested activities are not compulsory for Nursery Children.</p> <p align="center">Kind regards Mrs Culvin and Ms Donougher</p>		<p><u>MATHS</u> Count how many animals are in the story 'What the Ladybird Heard'. Are there more than one of any animal?</p> <p>Draw a template of a ladybird print the card at home. Add dots on the ladybird using a felt tip or playdoh. Start with a smaller number then gradually building up to ten. To make it trickier, don't go in number order. Challenge: Give specific directions such as six on the right and four on the left.</p>
<p><u>DAILY READING</u> Read 'What the Ladybird Heard' with your child. <i>If your child has never heard this story, you might want to read half and ask them to predict what happens next.</i> Here's a link of the story being read aloud on YouTube if you don't have a copy of the story at home. https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=XSbeEMfrkdw</p>	<p><u>What the Ladybird Heard</u></p> <p>Watch the ladybird life cycle! If you are able to/it is safe to do so, look for a ladybird outside. If you find one, ask an adult to take a picture to share with the other children.</p>		<p><u>EXPRESSIVE ARTS & DESIGN</u></p> <p>Create your own ladybird using a cardboard tube! <i>-activity card posted on dojo-</i></p>
<p><u>P.E.</u> Practice 'left' and 'right' with an adult. Play a directions game as if you're escaping through the farm! Turn left, take five steps, turn right, take two steps, turn right, hide behind something, turn left etc.</p>	<p><u>Education City</u> Everybody will be sent their own login to explore games and practice key skills.</p>	<p><u>Come and See- Good News</u> If you are able to, have a special celebration/dinner with your household. Make a party hat and celebrate some good news.</p>	<p><u>ICT</u> Have a go at some of the farm games on the cbeebies website! https://www.bbc.co.uk/cbeebies/shows/down-on-the-farm</p>
<p><u>P.S.E.D.</u> Play dominoes or a board game that uses a dice if you have them at home. Look at how the dots are similar to those on a ladybird. Talk about taking turns and sharing the pieces fairly. (Any other game that encourages these skills would do!)</p>
